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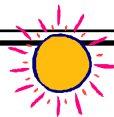

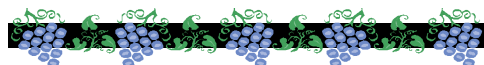


## DIOCESAN ECW SUMMER FESTIVAL AT ST. MATTHEW'S, AUGUST 15

Dear Friends of St. Paul's:

There is an opportunity in the form of a challenge on our horizon.

In the August issue of *Diocesan Life*, the monthly newspaper of the Diocese of Bethlehem, there is a series of articles regarding the New Hope Campaign of our diocese. In his article, Bishop Paul reports that "In September, every member of the diocese will be given the opportunity to join this work with glad hearts...." The Campaign is a part of the Episcopal Church's nationwide participation in the global Millennium Development Goals (MDG), which aim to reduce global poverty. You will receive your copy of the newspaper in the next several days, and I urge you to read it prayerfully. Or, you may find a copy on the diocesan web site: [www.diobeth.org](http://www.diobeth.org).

Over ten consecutive Sundays this past spring, the parishioners of St. Paul's read about the Millennium Goals in the Sunday bulletin. The eight goals are as follows: eradicate extreme poverty and hunger; achieve universal primary education; promote gender equality and empower women; reduce child mortality; improve maternal health; combat HIV/AIDS, malaria and other diseases; ensure environmental sustainability; and, establish a global partnership for development. Our diocese has chosen to fully support the MDG, and go an extra mile. Bishop Paul writes: "With our New Hope program we have chosen to go the extra mile, several extra miles in fact, in a campaign to raise \$3.6 million for the destitute in Sudan and in Northeast Pennsylvania....In calling ourselves to go the extra mile in the MDG effort we are making for Kajo-Keji and our own poor, we are calling ourselves to transformation, to growing more into the image of God we were created to reflect."

The opportunity and challenge for a significant outreach project now presents itself to us individually and personally at St. Paul's.

Your vestry will be discussing this opportunity for outreach at its forthcoming meeting, and will be reporting to you, and to the diocese, the response of St. Paul's. As we enter this process, may I suggest we begin with prayer:

*Almighty and eternal God, so draw our hearts to you, so guide our minds, so fill our imaginations, so control our wills, that we may be wholly yours, utterly dedicated to you; and then use us, we pray, as you will, and always to your glory and the welfare of your people; through our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Amen.*

## Choir News- Why Do We Sing?

Walking through the woods up the hill from the fishing pond to the car along the road, I noticed the familiar sights and smells, and I thought of the few short weeks left for Joe to go Bass fishing. As this season ends, another one begins at St. Paul's. In a few short weeks choir will reconvene, first on Sunday at 9:30, and next on Wednesdays at 7:00 p.m. Why do we look forward to singing in the choir again? First and always we Praise God in song. One reason I find pleasure in the singing, is the memory of the familiar hymns from early childhood, even from Sunday School. The words to hymns often come from poetry or some psalm, being much easier to remember when sung. The Anthems chosen for each week reflect the Scripture Lessons in some way, even to restating some to the text of the Gospel or the Old Testament. Remembering the scriptures again is much easier when all is put to music.



If you say you can't join the choir because you don't read music, you are mistaken. Standing near someone at practice who is sure of their part will give you confidence to sing along. If you say you can't make all the rehearsals, no one will be concerned, come as often as you can. Scott gives us the Anthems a few weeks ahead of the Sunday we are to sing them, so they will become very familiar. On Sunday mornings before the 10 a.m. service, Scott runs over all the hymns once more, and we always have a last minute brush-up for the Anthem. If you say you are too old to try something new, then take a new look at all the great possibilities of life.

Here is a chance to spread your wings a bit and give St. Paul's Choir a try. When we reconvene in a few short weeks, the notice will be given in the Sunday Bulletin and also from the front of the Church, no doubt. This will be a time for you to say, "O.K. I think I will give choir a try". We really hope to see some new, enthusiastic faces in the choir stalls this Fall.

**An Appeal to Minister in Afghanistan**

Dear Friends of St. Paul’s:

I have just finished reading a very long email from Maren Walter, Sarah Bertsch-Johnson’s daughter. Her husband, Travis, is in the army in Afghanistan. He has been deployed there since January. In her email she details the hardship of being part of a military family. (Copies of the email in its entirety can be obtained in the back of the church.)

Maren asks all of us to keep all those engaged – the civilians and the combatants in Afghanistan -- in our prayers. At St. Paul’s, we do pray for all places in conflict in our Sunday prayers; and, also pray for those civilians and military that have been wounded or killed.

She also suggests that we provide supplies to our personnel in the country, and has sent a list of those items that would be helpful, especially writing material for children. This list may also be found on the table in the back of the church.

Maren makes a very powerful, personal statement: “I have to do something. . . Too many good people have died. Too many of my friends don’t have spouses. Too many soldiers run around my neighborhood doing PT in the morning with legs made of steel instead of flesh.”

Then she says she has had a revelation about “ways we as Christians can help.” She writes: “. . . we as Christians are the ones that need to change the war and save the lives of all the people caught in the cross-fire. . . I feel that Christians need to be praying that Iraqi and Afghani militants would experience Jesus in a powerful way.”

This is going to be taken up by the Daughters of the King. It just seems that anyone else who has an interest should also be able to take part. And, Father Charles has approached the Brotherhood of St. Andrew for their participation, especially with the mailing of the packages.

**From the Archives: The Guild Room**

When the new Parish house was dedicated in 1927, the room containing the Warriner portraits and the portraits of St. Paul's Rectors became The Guild Room, to be used for the meetings of St. Paul's Guild.

St. Paul's Guild came into being in 1901 as an outgrowth of "The Working Guild" which had been organized initially in 1887.

The Working Guild had been organized, as the Rev. Miss Merrell noted in her *History*, "to sponsor activities which would have been considered frivolous for the vestry's limited budget." Officially, the Working Guild's purpose was "...the promotion and encouragement of Christian Good Fellowship, the building up and increasing of the Church and Sunday School both socially and religiously."

Among the early "fund-raisers" was a lecture, *Life In The Frozen North* and an operetta, *Penelope*.

The first president of the Working Guild was Harry O. Watrous, an ancestor of Kay Watrous. The Guild's first act was to purchase a forty-dollar Christmas tree and the candy for the Sunday School Christmas party in 1887.

It appears that the Working Guild was responsible ten years later for beginning the tradition of an annual parish meeting. The Guild had suggested that meetings be held in January on the date of the Conversion of St. Paul, to review parish finances, and activities in the parish throughout the preceding year.

In 1901 the Working Guild conducted a number of fund-raisers, making enough money to pay for the first electric lights in the church.

After many active and fruitful years, the Working Guild voted in 1915 to include all the women in the parish in a new organization to be called *St. Paul's Guild*. Twenty-four members attended the first meeting at which Mrs. E.A. Warriner was elected President. In 1915, war was imminent having already involved Great Britain, and the Guild's first purchase, with the help of the Junior Auxiliary and the Sunday School was a new American flag for the church.

In 1970 the Guild Room was newly decorated and remodeled. The painting of "Moses Striking the Rock" was moved to its place over the Parish house fireplace, replaced by portraits of the Reverend Edward A. Warriner and his son, the donor of the Parish house, Samuel D. Warriner.

The Guild Room carpeting, the chandelier and the cupboards were purchased with funds provided by Chester and Jean Rose, Edward and Lucille Little and John and Eleanor McKeage. Much of the remodeling work was done by the Littles and the McKeages. The chestnut conference table, having served for many years in the mail room of Beach Manufacturing, was donated by John and Ellie McKeage.

Enrico Caruso donated his labor in laying the Guild Room carpeting.

## HYMN STORY

*Guide Me, O Thou Great Jehovah (Hymn 690)*

William Williams (1717-1781) was born the son of a prosperous farmer in Wales. He intended to become a physician, but at a revival meeting, he committed himself to ministry. In doing so, he solved a serious problem. The problem was this: The Welsh love to sing, but there were few good hymns in the Welsh language. The solution was this: William Williams proved to be a prolific hymn writer -- a great Welsh poet.

Williams wrote more than eight hundred hymns during his lifetime. "Guide Me, O Thou Great Jehovah" is one of the few that has been translated into English and is the only one in common use in English-language churches today.

This hymn is a prayer for a person going through tough times -- a person traveling through a barren land -- a thirsty person in need of water.

Have you ever felt like that? Have you ever felt confused, wondering where to turn? Have you ever felt the need for someone to point you in the right direction! Have you ever felt the need of a strong helping hand? If so, this is your hymn -- your prayer. It admits, "I am weak," but it answers, "Thou art mighty!" It asks, "Hold me with Thy powerful hand." It prays, "Feed me till I want no more." And then it promises, "Songs of praises, songs of praises, I will ever give to Thee."

The hymn has become a part of Welsh life and is often sung spontaneously. For many years, Welsh crowds at rugby matches or other public gatherings would sing this hymn, much as we in the U.S. start games with the playing of the National Anthem. And, legend has it that many Welsh people were inspired to learn to read just so they could read the words to Williams' hymns.

William Williams turned out to be both a great hymn writer and a great evangelist. During his many years of ministry, he traveled nearly 100,000 miles (160,000 km), often drawing crowds of 10,000 people who came to hear his preaching and sing his songs. He had a great impact on the people of Wales and, through his music, on the entire world. (adapted from Dick Donovan)

## IT'S IN THE PRAYER BOOK

St. Paul's has been blessed with a very active and productive push into the summer. The services at both St. Paul's and St. Matthew's have experienced above average attendance, and the faithful generosity of our parishioners and visitors continues, allowing us to bridge the painful financial doldrums. Thank you, all, for not forgetting St. Paul's, which never takes a vacation in its ministry and outreach!

The Catechism in our Prayer Book, which begins on page 845, is actually called An Outline of the Faith. It is the place where one can encounter the richness of our Anglican faith and heritage. Here's a sample, from page 855:

Q. Who are the ministers of the Church?

A. The ministers of the Church are lay persons, bishops, priests, and deacons.

Q. What is the ministry of the laity?

A. The ministry of lay persons is to represent Christ and his church; to bear witness to him wherever they may be; and, according to the gifts given to them, to carry on Christ's work of reconciliation in the world; and to take their place in the life, worship, and governance of the Church.

### 45 Days 'Til Lectio Divina!

The Brothers Andrew is sponsoring a learning event in mid-September. Maybe your prayer life has reached a plateau. You read the bible or other spiritual books and you don't feel you are getting a message. Lectio Divina is here. Actually, it never really left. It's just been hiding.

We'll have a special teacher coming in from Contemplative Outreach, a group that specializes in "quiet prayer". First, on Friday night, September 14 at 6:00 pm there will be a two hour get together to meet the workshop instructor, Mike Potter, from Memphis, Tennessee. He will explain the history and take us through a session. Questions are good.

Next, starting at 8:45 am on Saturday and running till 3:00 pm we will experience three sessions of Lectio Divina (LD) and get a little closer to God. **People are welcome, at no charge, at either or both sessions.** Registration would be appreciated as we are also providing a simple lunch. Vegetarian fare will be available.

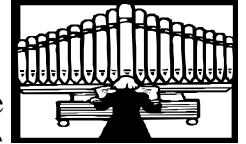
The final event is formation training for pre-registered students who meet special criteria. As of now, four people will be attending this event following the LD workshop. Since the Eastern Region currently has only one LD presenter, this training session will increase LD presenters by 400 percent! The Holy Spirit is alive and well in Montrose.

By now the Guild Room has a "Lectio Divina Treasure Chest". It has some books and articles on LD as well as audio and video tapes. Sign out the material, read or listen and return. Again there is no charge. **There are registration brochures, and preregistration is requested.**

The Brothers Andrew have as their three purposes: Prayer, Study, Service. This LD event combines all three. The event is about expanding your (our) prayer life, it will require study during the event, and it is provided at no charge to people of the Montrose area.

From The Archives: *The Organ*



It has been said that the unique quality of the music made by pipe organs can be traced, in part, to its resemblance to the human voice. The human voice, in turn, is used in worship to express the ideas we have about our relationship with God and music enhances the expression of the emotions accompanying those ideas.

Over the years, St. Paul's music program, and its organ, have been crucial in supporting the expressions of gratitude, hope and joy contained in countless acts of worship. In 1866, Mr. William Oliver, Organist and Vestryman, was authorized to travel to Boston to procure an organ for St. Paul's. According to the Rev. Miss Merrell's *History*, he was able to purchase "a fine organ for \$1000, which is really worth \$1500 to \$1800".

In 1907, Vestry allocated \$2.50 per week to be paid to a boy to pump the organ, but by 1908 Vestry had decided that it was time to purchase a new instrument. In 1912 the new water-powered organ, constructed by the Beeman Company was installed, at a cost of about \$3000. The Choir was vested for the first time in 1912, partly in honor of the new organ. Robert Welden, Joe's Dad, began his 65-year service as Crucifer, leading the choir in the processional. Miss Fannie Bunnell, in the middle of her forty-three year career as organist played the new organ until her retirement in 1934.

The organ served for many years, with periodic repair, upgrading and refurbishment, but in 1995 it was decided that major changes were in order. A new console was constructed and various electro-mechanical components were replaced with modern, solid-state devices. The cost of upgrading the \$3000 instrument was approximately \$24,000.

**Altar Guild**
