The clothing will be delivered to Lathrop Street Elementary School, Montrose; Choconut Valley Elementary School, Choconut; Susquehanna Elementary School, Susquehanna; Blue Ridge Elementary School, New Milford; Mountain View Elementary School, Kingsley; and Elk Lake Elementary School, Dimock.

You may not want to wait until Oct 7! Bring your contribution of underwear, socks, sweats of all sizes and deposit them in the basket at the rear of the church. Dear Friends in Christ,

On Saturday, October 6, the leadership of the parishes of the Northern Tier of our diocese, and our bishop and diocesan staff, will meet at St. Paul's for a unique assembly Under One Roof: An Assembly for Churches in Small Communities. The event is sponsored and hosted by the Vestry of St. Paul's. I invite you to read more about the gathering, which is found elsewhere in this newsletter.

The leadership of the Northern Tier parishes assemble to deal with the realities of ministering in an area of small communities, and like-wise small membership churches. The goal of the shared day is to discern the blessings and challenges that we all face.

What are the realities we all face in the Northern Tier:

- a low, very dispersed population
- a steady decline in population
- a very low economic level
- a "somewhat" low educational level
- a resistance to change
- a very low financial support/potential support

views the church as "recreational" as opposed to spiritual development.

The initial response to this data from the 2000 Census can be a sense of despair and hopelessness. However, the leadership of St. Paul's thinks otherwise!

If I may borrow from C. S. Lewis's *Screwtape Letters*, Satan is lurking in those statements!

Data like that can tempt church leadership to feel overwhelmed, pessimistic, and defeated. Satan at work!

Data like that can drive small, dedicated parishes into a "survival" mentality, where the first casualties are vision and imagination. Satan at work!

Data like that can seduce hard-working, faithful parishes into a posture of isolation and despair, withdrawing from the larger, nourishing community of faith. Satan at work!

At Under One Roof, we will gather to face these realities from our faith perspective, we will join to count the blessings of being small – small is beautiful – and share how we can find God's call and presence in the data.

Not wanting to preempt the work of the gathering let me suggest we weigh some of our blessings, the grace of God in our small communities and parishes:

- a call to spiritual renewal and growth
- a sense that our “small” congregations can be the generators of healthy, welcoming relationships
- create partnerships with neighboring churches for worship, spiritual renewal and outreach
- establish strong ties with nearby Episcopal Churches, plan joint events

celebrate the fact that a small community offers easy communication opportunities.

I firmly believe that when we look for God in the midst of our lives, we will discover and open the font of many blessings. When we allow cynicism and pessimism to infect our lives of faith and hope, we impede the flow of God’s blessings.

We have found this to be true at St. Paul’s – when we have been counter-intuitive, thinking outside the box – we have been showered by God’s grace.

I ask for your prayers for the gathering Under One Roof. Pray for the leadership of the Northern Tier, our bishop and diocesan staff, and for our all our partner parishes:

*You have called each of us, Lord God,  
to serve your people in the Church  
and to serve your people in the world,  
and you have given us rich gifts for the fulfillment  
of the ministries you have given us;  
pour out those gifts, we pray,  
on your Church in the Northern Tier  
and especially on those who are called  
to the ministry of leadership  
strengthen all of us to serve you in unity and faithfulness  
to the benefit of your people  
and to the glory of your great Name. Amen.*

A special day to celebrate the mission and ministry of Historic St. Paul’s will be held on Sunday, November 11, beginning with worship at 9 AM. On this day the whole parish family will join for worship, rededication, and fellowship.

The day will begin with our thanksgiving to God for the many blessing bestowed upon us during the past year. We will join for an extended coffee hour in the Parish House. Then, we will hear from the Vestry on the proposed plans and budget for the coming year.

Please mark this day on your calendar, and plan to attend.

## NEW HOPE CAMPAIGN

The Diocese of Bethlehem, after a long relationship with the Diocese of Kajo Keji in the southern Sudan, has established a campaign to assist the diocese in its recovery from the destructive civil war, and to assist the needy in northeast Pennsylvania. Every member of the diocese will be able to contribute to this campaign.

The New Hope campaign goal is to raise \$3.6 million over a 5-year period. The effort will fulfill the Millennium Development Goals, which were adopted by the General Convention of the Episcopal Church.

The Diocese of Kajo Keji will received \$2.7 million and will be used for these proposed projects:

- \$1,100,000 is to complete, equip, and provide support for then Canon Benaiah Poggo College and diocesan center.
- \$1,100,000 is to build, equip, staff, and support five primary schools and one secondary school.
- \$250,000 is to fund a micro-finance program for families starting small businesses and for parishes projects.

\$250,000 is to provide administrative support at home and in the Sudan to improve communications, provide transparent accountability, and ensure our monies are invested and used for the intended purposes.

The Diocese of Bethlehem will receive \$900,000 for projects to find new and ongoing parish ministries:

- Good Shepherd Church's initiate in Scranton to convert its undercroft into a homeless shelter;
- Christ Church's efforts in Stroudsburg to expand its free medical services; and,

The work of Father Cesaretti to provide outreach ministries in the Northern Tier of the diocese.

Bishop Paul has reported that during the summer the campaign received gifts and pledges of half of the goal amount of \$3.6 million. Now we are in the larger phase of the campaign and I ask you to join me in making a truly sacrificial gift to this work. You can target your gift for Pennsylvania or Sudan if that is what you hear God saying to you in particular.

You will receive in the mail a packet of New Hope Campaign Envelopes. The packet has 15 monthly envelopes with return postage paid. You may use the envelopes to remit payment for your Faith Promise (pledge). You may also return your payment by placing the envelope in the regular Sunday collection, and St. Paul's will forward your gift. If you use a check, please make it payable to the *New Hope Fund*.

## **NORTHERN TIER PARISHES TO MEET UNDER ONE ROOF AT ST. PAUL'S, OCT. 6**

On Saturday, October 6, parishes of the Northern Tier of the diocese will assemble at St. Paul's, with the Bishop Paul and the diocesan staff, for a day Under One Roof. The assembly will bring together the leadership of the parishes for a day of celebration and discernment in the mission and ministry of parishes in small communities. The Vestry of St. Paul's is the host of the event, and has taken leadership in gathering our partner churches together.

Bishop Paul and Father Charles wrote to every parish in the Tier inviting them to the one-day event. Addressing the purpose and focus of the assembly, Fr. Charles wrote the parishes:

“The parishes in the Northern Tier share many of the same issues and concerns, experience many of the same needs, minister in similar situations, sense the same dynamic of isolation, aspire to the same goal of faithfulness. Yet, we rarely assemble to share our commonalities, seldom join to celebrate our special joys and blessings, never bear each other's burdens, hardly ever share our stories of God's grace in our lives. Under One Roof is designed to move away from this disconnectedness.

“Under One Roof is an attempt to bring our devoted and dedicated parish leaders together to celebrate our call to ministry, to recognize and uplift the trust given us by our parishioners, to reach out to our partners across the region to effect and enable a strong and vital presence. Under One Roof invites us to do this with our Chief Pastor and those dedicated to be our enablers.

“Under One Roof is an opportune time for the Parishes of the Northern Tier to grab hold of the implications of the New Hope Campaign. Just as we are all challenged by this bold and creative effort to make it's great missionary and financial goal, so are we challenged to make it a success by planning our part in designing the response to the \$900,000 that will be used to meet the outreach needs of our diocese. We are all responsible to put forward the outreach opportunities of our region. May I be bold in suggesting that this will be possible through our joint efforts.”

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## **BISHOP PAUL TO VISIT ST. PAUL'S SUNDAY, DECEMBER 2**

The Rt. Rev. Paul Marshall, Bishop of the Diocese of Bethlehem, will make his Episcopal visitation to St. Paul's on Sunday, December 2. The bishop will lead the worship and preach. The bishop will meet with the vestry and the congregation to receive an update on the parish's ministry and outreach, as well as hear the needs of the congregation. 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### ST. PAUL'S, MONTROSE HOSTS CRAFTERS ON 1<sup>ST</sup> FRIDAY OF MONTH

St. Paul's, Montrose is hosting a Crafters Corner Store the 1<sup>st</sup> Friday of every month in its Parish House, beginning Friday, October 5. The initiative is to bring local crafters, who work at home, to a public place to display and sell their crafts. "This is what is often called a 'incubator' scheme," reports Rachel Warriner Barton, Sr. Warden of St. Paul's. "It offers free space to local entrepreneurs to advance and enhance their ventures. We did this last year with a local person who wanted to establish a chocolate store in Montrose.

He used our parish kitchen for several months, establishing and testing the local response and cliental. He has successfully opened a chocolate factor in town. We hope that our space will offer our local creative and hard-working crafters, mostly women, the same opportunity."

The Crafters Corner will be open the first Friday of each month, commencing with the Grand Opening on October 5<sup>th</sup>. Hours will be from 11:00 a.m. to 7:30 p.m., in an effort to provide daytime access, as well as affording shoppers an entertaining option for after work and the early evening hours. The Church Street Singers, who will perform "Broadway Favorites," and encourage participation from the audience, will provide musical entertainment from 6 – 6:30 PM. There will be occasional musical events, with the intent of providing a free venue for local singers and musicians, including students, to share their talents. Refreshments and light meals will also be available for shoppers.

"We hope the success of the Crafters Corner Store will encourage other parishes to consider being incubators for local cottage industries. St. Paul's gives thanks for the leadership, creativity, and hard work of parishioners Rita Leigh, Sandy Schwab, and Esther Welden. And, we commend the diocese for the New Hope Campaign, which has the great potential to assist in such parish-based ventures," opined Bartron.



## BLESSING OF THE ANIMALS SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 4

Holy Name of Mary Roman Catholic Church and St. Paul's Episcopal Church are joining for a special service of Blessing of the Animals on Sunday, September 30, at the Gazebo at Holy Name of Mary at 1 PM. The two parishes share the custom in remembrance of St. Francis of Assisi's love for all creatures, and both religious traditions observe the Feast of St. Francis on October 4.

Of all the saints, Francis (1182-1226) is the most popular and admired, but probably the least imitated; few have attained to his total identification with the poverty and suffering of Christ. He left few writings; but, of these, his spirit of joyous faith come through most truly in the "Canticle of the Sun," which he composed at Clare's [one of Francis' most devoted followers] convent of St. Damian's. That prayer can be found in the Hymnal (#406), which begins:

Most High, omnipotent, good Lord,  
To thee be ceaseless praise outpoured,  
And blessing without measure.  
Let creatures all give thanks to thee  
And serve in great humility.



*Most high, omnipotent, good Lord, grant your people grace to renounce gladly the vanities of this world; that, following the way of blessed Francis, we may for love of you delight in you whole creation with perfectness of joy; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, for ever and ever. Amen.*

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## IT'S IN THE PRAYER BOOK

### All Saints' Day, November 1

Christians from the earliest times have sought to express the intercommunion between the living and the dead in the Body of Christ. They wanted to commemorate those who had been faithful in the past, especially those who had died for their faithfulness. The expression of this intercommunion finds its expression in the Feast of All Saints.

Many scholars believe that the commemoration of all the saints on November 1 first originated in Ireland, spread from there to England, and then to the continent of Europe. It was widely observed throughout the Holy Roman Empire by the 9<sup>th</sup> Century CE. However, the observance of a festival of all martyrs is recorded as early as the 3<sup>rd</sup> Century CE.

All Saints' Day is classed, in the Prayer Book of 1979, as a Principal Feast, taking precedence over any other day or observance. Among the seven so classified, All Saints' Day alone may be observed on the following Sunday, in addition to its observance on its fixed date. It is one of the four days recommended in the Prayer Book (page 312) for the administration of Holy Baptism. This year we will be observing All Saints' Day on Sunday, November 4.

*Almighty God, you have knit together your elect in one communion and fellowship in the mystical body of your Son Christ our Lord: Give us grace so to follow your blessed saints in all virtuous and godly living, that we may come to those ineffable joys that you have prepared for those who truly love you; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who with you and the Holy Spirit lives and reigns, one God, in glory everlasting. Amen.*

## REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY

NOVEMBER 4

On Sunday, November 4, St. Paul's will observe Remembrance Sunday. On this Sunday, which follows All Saints' Day, November 1, the parish will remember and celebrate those who died this past year, and those of past generations whose life and ministry founded, built, and nurtured St. Paul's.

The memories of some of our recently departed parishioners are fresh in our minds; others are memorialized by windows and plaques in the church. However, we are ever mindful of the great cloud of witnesses that surrounds us in our worship and our ministry. We are deeply indebted to them for their faithfulness, their inspiration, and their generosity. They rest from their labors, but their legacy lives on encouraging and supporting us.

On Sunday, November 4, at the 9 AM service we will remember our forbearers and loved ones with a special service of remembrance.

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### WE READ UNDER THE EYE OF GOD UNTIL OUR HEARTS ARE TOUCHED AND LEAP TO FLAME

Thanks to the St. Andrew's Brotherhood chapter at St. Paul's, and the Contemplative Outreach network (<http://www.contemplativeoutreach.org/>), a dozen of us attending a workshop in Montrose on September 15th were introduced to the ancient practice of reading the Divine Word as taught by the earliest Christians.

During this presentation by Mike Potter, who flew in from Tennessee for the all day affair, the participants were led to see how the Holy Spirit "Hounds, Honors and Helps" attentive readers in their daily lives.

During the coming weeks, the Adult Forum will be considering sermons and addresses by the Presiding Bishop, Katharine Jefferts Schori, who continues to emphasize the importance of ongoing education by asking: "Who are we, where have we come from, why are we here, and what are we going to do about it?" I want to invite you to consider not only how your work and study in this place help you to make sense of those questions, but how theological thinking is going to help to shape the rest of your life." All are encouraged to join in these Sunday morning discussions in the Parish House immediately following the Eucharist.

Finally, there is a provocative and thoughtful discussion of how the people of Abraham came to become "the people of the book" in Leonard Shlain's study: *The Alphabet Versus the Goddess* (Penguin 1999). New insights bolster and deepen our religious experience. This is the reason we gather each Sunday for the Service of the Word, as well as for the sacrament of Eucharist. We welcome your participation.

## History of St. Paul's.

The Rev. Miss Margaret Merrell finished her *A History of St. Paul's Parish* in 1956. An effort to update the parish history has been underway for the past several months, based so far on the minutes of Vestry meetings and Annual Meetings since 1956. The minutes of meetings are somewhat limited as sources relating to the parish's pursuit of its mission, but the people of the parish are an invaluable source of information – and more important – insight as they live out their individual and corporate baptismal commitments.

Several areas of activity stand out as important parts of St. Paul's History. It is requested that people with special knowledge in one or more of these areas write down information they feel would contribute to a better understanding of St. Paul's continuing history.

The Lectio Divina workshop has come and gone. So it's over, right? In one sense, the EVENT is over, but it WAS a workshop. If you go to a workshop on golf, the workshop, in a sense, is over that day. In the case of the Lectio Divina Workshop, the subject was prayer. We learned four "moments": Lectio, Meditatio, Oratio, Contemplatio. For those who are not Latin scholars, the English equivalent: read, reflect, respond, rest. That's a literary translation, not a literal translation. In a nutshell, we learned to slow down and let God talk to us.

You'll notice in the Guild Room a couple of Lectio Divina (LD) treasure chests. These have resources (books, audio tapes, video tapes, articles) that can be used to learn more about LD. You could also give me a call (Al 278-0205) and we could discuss LD.

You'll want to know a little about HOW the weekend progressed. There was supposed to be a two-hour session on Friday evening. You'd think that an arrival time of 12:30 pm would give you enough time to pick up the instructor, Mike Potter, from his flight from Memphis, Tennessee. No such luck! After hourly delays of an hour or two, they finally cancelled the flight altogether at 6:00 pm. Luckily, he changed his flight after the second delay and arrived at 7:15 pm. Cell phones are a wonderful invention! After a dinner at the Summit Tea Room, we got to my computer at home to change and print the Saturday schedule.

Fifty percent of those who attended the workshop were from St. Paul's and fifty percent came from NY, NJ, and Ohio. Everyone appreciated the prayer training and look forward to using our newly learned prayer experience on a daily basis. Submitted by Al Leigh

### **Church School Blows in with a Presence!**

The Church School Scholars resumed their studies on September 16<sup>th</sup> with a lot of hot air—playing a game to illustrate that unequal is not always unfair. Our fall curriculum is posted downstairs on the wall in the purple room, please come see it. Beginning with the Baptismal Covenant (9/23), continuing with Symbols of the Eucharist (10/14) and concluding with Prayer Beads (11/18), the children will understand the foundations of our faith and how our worship services reflect and reiterate these fundamentals.
