Dear Friends in Christ,

The scripture readings we have been hearing during these past months, and those that are before us in the coming months, bear a potential summons to each of us from God. As we listen and ponder these readings, we would do well to ask ourselves the question, “What is God summoning me to do through these words?” The overarching theme is “discipleship.”

By divine happenstance, on December 2, Bishop Paul will be visiting St. Paul’s for confirmation. Information about the visit and confirmation may be found elsewhere in this newsletter. I would like to suggest to you that it is not an accident that, just as we complete the full course of the scripture readings on “discipleship,” discerning God’s summons to each of us, we will welcome the bishop to “confirm” those who are prepared to make a commitment to be disciples of Jesus Christ.

The scripture, and the liturgy we have been using this summer, provide us with numerous examples of God’s summons. In Genesis we read that out of chaos, darkness, and turmoil, God brought forth light and life. In Exodus, we read that out of slavery and the wilderness, God summoned the Children of Israel into a new way. In the books of the prophets (Amos, Hosea, Isaiah, and Jeremiah), we read of God’s call through oft-times frail and wounded spokespersons to repentance, renewal, and reunion through forgiveness. We have been reading, dear friends, about a risk-taking, bold sort of God who reaches in, summons and calls people for divine service, giving them what they need for that service.

Our Gospel readings from St. Luke began with Jesus’ summons to ministry. As the spirit descends upon the baptized Jesus, depicted for us is the fact that not only does God summon us, but moves in and shapes a new future. And, as Luke continues with his account of Jesus’ ministry, we are assured that we are not alone, as persons are called to join in realizing that new future.

As a worshipping and learning congregation, we are invited to ask ourselves the question posed above “what is God summoning me to do through these words?” How is the scripture we have been reading YOUR story too and not just ancient history?

On Sunday, December 2, we will all gather around our bishop and be witnesses as he confirms and receives those who are committing themselves to Christ. However, we all might use this occasion to “reaffirm” our discipleship, our response to God’s summons. Here are the words that the bishop uses for reaffirmation: “...may the Holy Spirit, who has begun a good work in you, direct and uphold you in the service of Christ and his kingdom. Amen.” (See page 419 of the Prayer Book)

Our decision to maintain the 9 am service was made after we debated the pros and cons of each in relation to the above framework. Consistency is important for education and formation programming as well as welcoming new families and friends (therefore one Sunday service). With the Wednesday evening Eucharist, we have allowed another time and place to worship (quiet, later in the day).

As you can imagine, our vestry meetings are anything but dull! We are energized by our charge, enthusiastic by our place, and ever so thankful in our prayers. Please know that you can contact ANY vestry member with concerns or questions and these will be relayed to the vestry as a whole. On behalf of the vestry, I thank you for your prayers, your support and your commitment to St. Paul's.

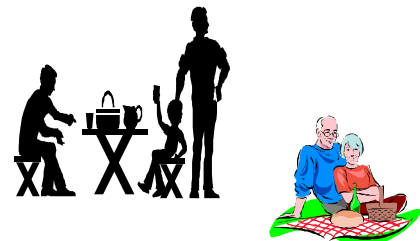
beverages, bottled water, wet wipes, as well as lawn chairs for yourself.

IT'S IN THE PRAYER BOOK

On Sunday, December 2, Bishop Paul will visit St. Paul's for confirmation and his "Episcopal" visit with the parish.

What is confirmation? Well, by now we know that the first place we go to find an answer to such questions is The Catechism in our Prayer Book, which begins on page 845. Here's what it says about "confirmation" on page 860:

Q: What is Confirmation?

A: Confirmation is the rite in which we express a mature commitment to Christ, and receive strength from the Holy Spirit through prayer and the laying on of hands by a bishop.

Q: What is required of those to be confirmed?

A: It is required of those to be confirmed that they have been baptized are sufficiently instructed in the Christian Faith, are penitent for their sins, and are read to affirm their confession Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord.

The Service of Confirmation is found in the Prayer Book, beginning on page 413.

Welcome Church Schoolers

Church School will resume on September 16th at 10:15, following the 9 am worship service. Children will have a snack at coffee hour and then will go to the Purple Room downstairs for an hour; the hour will be divided into three sections: 1/ music, 2/ lessons and stories, and 3/ activity/ project. The children will be finished by 11:30 am.

We are grateful for the continued guidance and musical talents of Dawn Washo. The children will prepare several songs and present these during the 9 am service throughout the year.

In the early fall, the lessons will focus on the Episcopal faith including the Nicene Creed, the baptismal covenant, and the liturgical service. By November, we will begin to examine ways and types of prayer. December will be centered on the birth of Christ and the advent season. Throughout the fall, we will incorporate stories from *Tell Me A Story* by Max Lucado. "The stories in this book are tiny slices of the larger story of God and His people—a story into which you and your children are intricately woven." (from the book)

After Christmas (and a little break), the children will begin to study the Gospel stories from the book of John. We will use these stories to help draw the connection between the life and ministry of Jesus and our own lives.

Our activities and projects will be a reminder of the lessons as well as a further understanding of topics covered in class. For example, in November, the children will make prayer beads as a concrete reminder of ways and means of prayer. We are eager to have visitors come and share talents. If you are interested, please let Rachel know!

Finally, we will continue to work with Heifer International in a "Read to Feed" project. We will explore ways to get involved in our own community as well. Details will be forthcoming.

And please mark your calendars for the 5 pm Christmas Eve service (a special treat for all) and the 2nd annual Easter Egg Hunt at St. Paul's on March 22nd. Depending on snowfall, we plan to repeat our sledding party (with hot chocolate and treats) in February or March.

HYMN STORY

Rejoice, Ye Pure in Heart (Hymn 556, 557)

Edward Plumptre served for years as chaplain and professor at King's College in London. He taught biblical exegesis and theology, which can be pretty dull subjects -- but this hymn proves that Plumptre had a common touch. That surely was responsible for the esteem in which his students held him.

Plumptre wrote this as a processional hymn for a choir festival at Peterborough Cathedral (England). A choir festival involved gathering choirs from churches throughout the diocese -- a dozen or more choirs with scores of singers. Imagine those choirs processing down the long center aisle of the cathedral -- one after the other -- with the cross and banner held aloft at the beginning of the processional. When the first verse of the hymn says, "your glorious banner wave on high" and "the cross of Christ your king," it is that processional banner and cross that he had in mind.

Such a processional could go on for as long as a half hour. Plumptre wrote ten verses to this hymn for that reason, but most hymnals today include only four or five.

This is a joyous hymn from beginning to end, and so it lifts our spirits to sing it. Our rejoicing brings just a bit of heaven into our lives here on earth. (Adapted from Dick Donovan)

End of Day

An Outreach Project of St. Paul's, Montrose

After a year of needs assessment and planning, the Outreach Committee of St. Paul's provided the seed money for The End of Day After School Program (EOD), and incorporated it as a non-profit childcare organization. The program was launched in 2002 and is currently licensed in three local elementary schools. EOD exemplifies the life of St. Paul's and its concern for the commonwealth of the community. EOD is open to all school age children, regardless of financial circumstances. It is open every full day that school is in session, which averages 175-180 days per year. EOD allows for a variety of enrollment options, including every day, a few days a week, or occasionally as the circumstances require.

The needs and ability of the child help form the curriculum. EOD offers quality after school time: a healthy snack, recreation, social time, crafts, and homework help. The staff helps with homework on a daily basis while tutors from the local Literacy Program are available twice a week for those in need of intensive work in reading and/or math. A daily fee of \$8 per day for services does not cover the expenses, and EOD depends upon the generosity of the community, including St. Paul's to assist with the full costs. EOD is licensed by the PA Department of Welfare, Child Care Services, and is a member of Keystone Stars, a quality improvement initiative for childcare agencies.

The bells will ring nine times on Sept. 10th to signify the nine months of pregnancy that a women should not drink alcohol.

Speed Reading vs. Sacred Reading

You've heard about speed reading ... you know, 2000 words a minute with 110% comprehension. But have you heard about SACRED reading? For over 1600 years it has been disguised in the Latin vocabulary as *Lectio Divina*(LD). It means sacred reading. **And** it is coming to Montrose, PA on September 14 and 15, 2007 (Friday night 6:30 – 8:30 pm and Saturday 8:45 am – 3:00 pm during the day)

Prayer is defined as an earnest request, entreaty, or supplication. LD has been described as "...one of the great treasures of the Christian tradition of prayer.

For twenty years a group located in Butler, NJ has been coordinating contemplative prayer under the umbrella organization called Contemplative Outreach, Ltd. In their brochure on LD they say, "*Lectio Divina* is the most traditional way of cultivating friendship with Christ. It is a way of listening to the texts of scripture as if we were in conversation with Christ and He was suggesting the topics of conversation. It is listening with the "ear" of the heart. The daily encounter with Christ and reflection on His Word leads beyond mere acquaintanceship to an attitude of friendship, trust and love. *Lectio Divina* leads us to communion or as Gregory the Great (6th c.), summarizing the Christian contemplative tradition says, "resting in God.""

A certified trainer from that group is coming to present two sessions. Friday night will be a limited, 2 hour session. Saturday will be a workshop format lasting 6 hours. You may attend either or both sessions, at no charge. All sessions will be at St. Paul's Episcopal Church, 60 Church Street, Montrose, Pa and is sponsored by the Brotherhood of St. Andrew.

Registration is requested so the free lunch may be provided with the right amount of food. Contact St. Paul's rectory at 570-278-2954.
